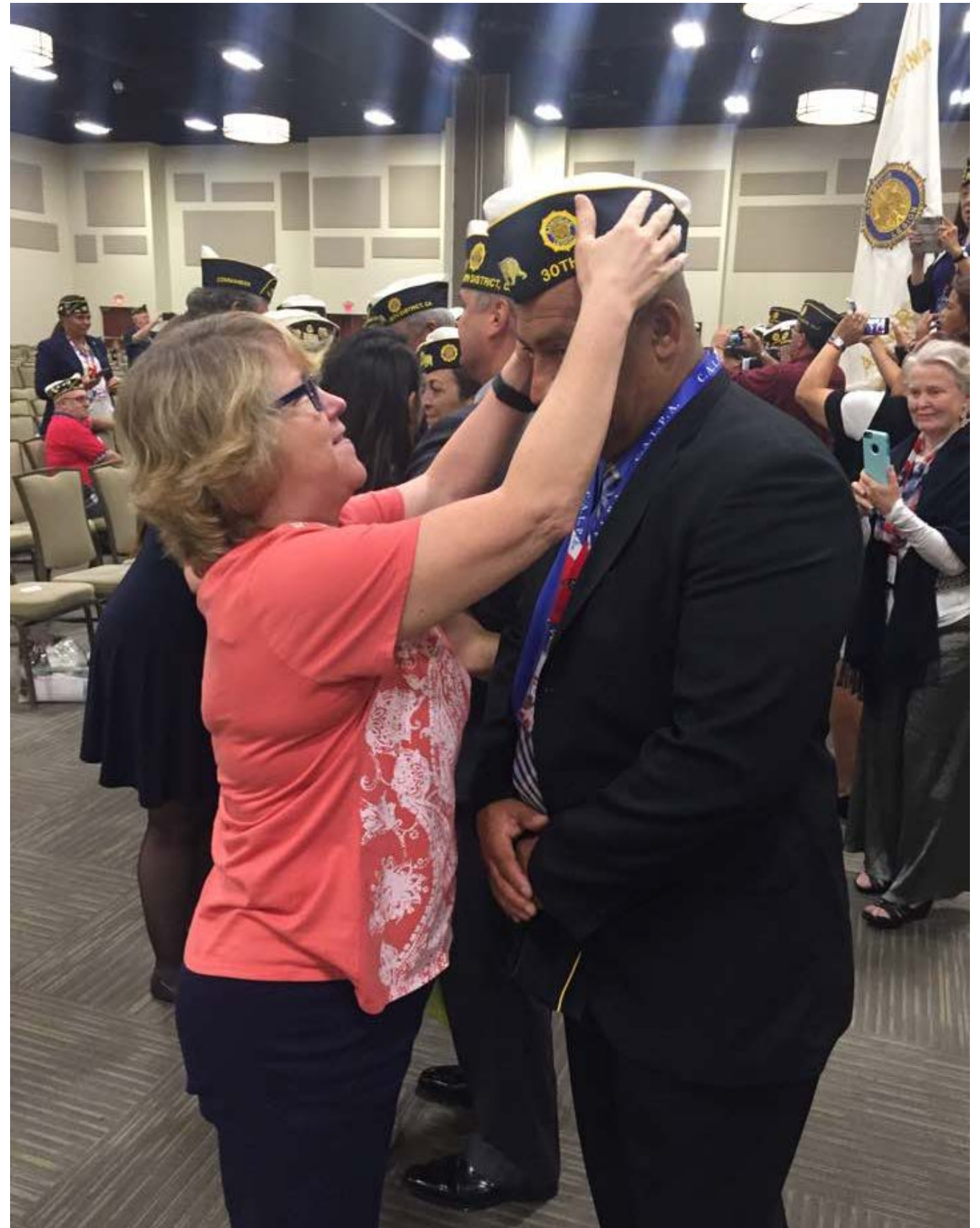

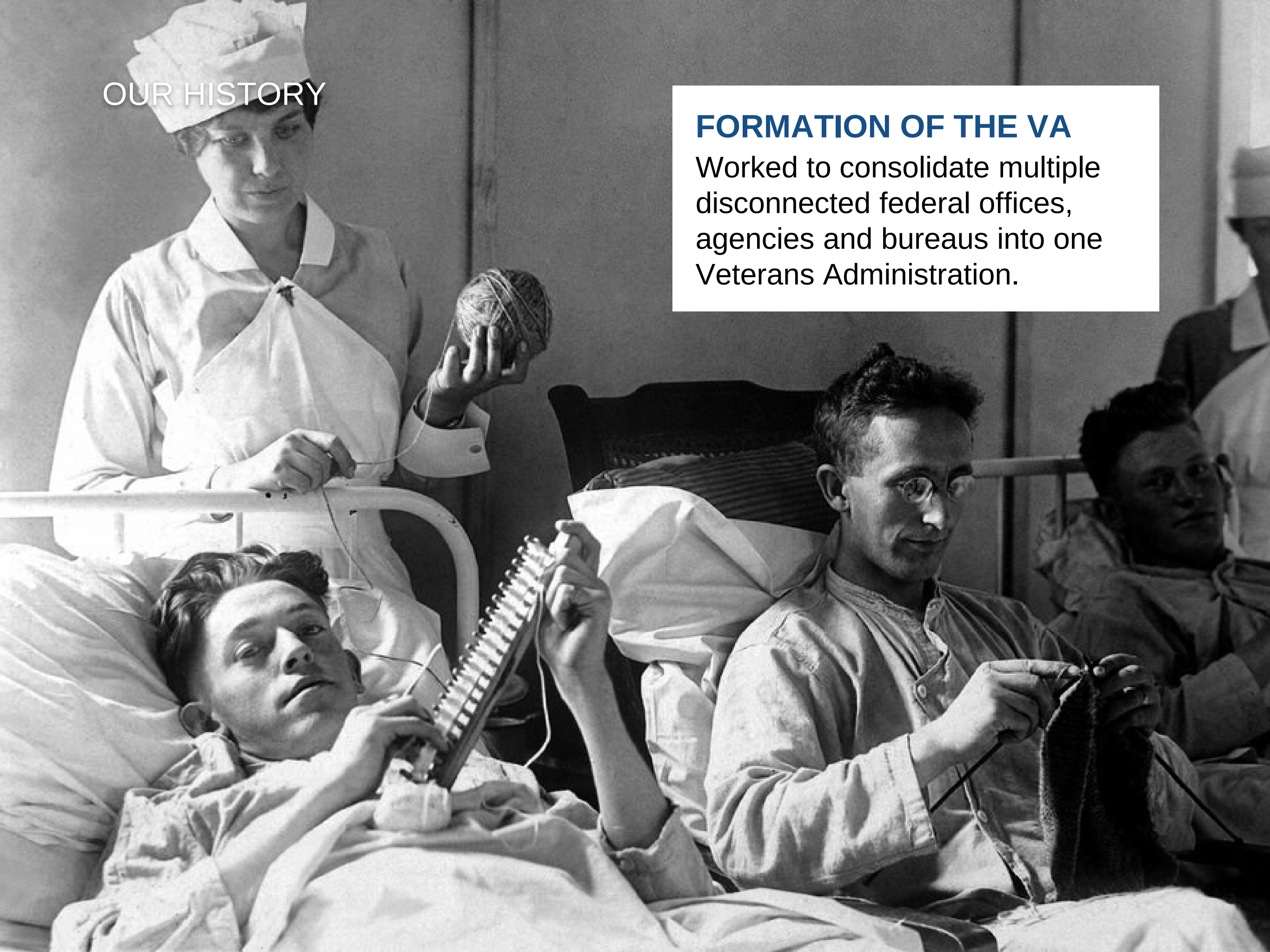

This project was included in our Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) 2015 – 2019 based on the fact that the City was able to secure funding through the LTA Measured “D” Program for the rehabilitation and reconstruction of the above-referenced section of Aten Boulevard.

The work included grinding existing AC pavement, placement of Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) leveling course, application of an Asphalt-Rubber Aggregate Membrane (ARAM) interlayer, installation of a final Asphalt-Rubber Hot Mix (ARHM) overlay, new pavement striping, as well as road traffic control around the construction zones.

An individual contract was awarded to Aggregate Products, Inc. (also known as API) through competitive bidding process for the proper completion of the above-described work.

All work was completed per Approved Improvement Plans, excepting for the elimination of construction item 5 (Crack Sealing) and the addition of raised pavement markers to the Scope-of-Work. Final quantities have been accounted in the balancing change order and EXHIBIT “A” attached herewith for review and approval.

Due to the asphalt grindings produced during the construction phase were not delivered to the City’s water reclamation plant, it is also recommended a \$2,500 retention to be released once 35 truckloads of new asphalt grindings be delivered to the City in lieu of the grindings produced during this overlay project. EXHIBIT “B” attached herewith for details.

The construction project was successfully completed on December 30, 2017.

Re: REQUEST FOR HIDTA FUNDS

The Imperial Police Department (IPD) has an officer assigned to the Imperial County Narcotic Task (ICNTF), a collocated task force in the Imperial Valley Drug Coalition (IVDC) Law Enforcement Coordination Center, and is the certified canine (K-9) handler for IPD and ICNTF. Recently, the narcotic detection K-9 (Parker) that was purchased with HIDTA funding was retired due to age and medical conditions that do not allow the K-9 to properly carry out his primary duties. The Imperial Police Department is requesting that the recently retired narcotic detection K-9 (Parker) be replaced to continue supporting the on-going mission of ICNTF, the other collocated task forces, and member agencies of the IVDC upon request and availability.

The IVDC is requesting that HIDTA funds in the amount of \$15,956.00 be made available to the Imperial Police Department to support this request as itemized below:

Cost of Narcotic Detection K-9: \$9,697.50

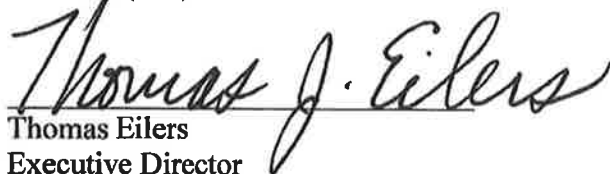
Cost of Training Course: Imperial Police Department has agreed to incur the cost of the (6) week training course tuition, but is requesting the following travel costs at the training location in Ontario, California.

Per Diem: \$54.00 X 42 days = \$2,268.00

Lodging: \$95.00 x 42 days = \$3,990.00
